The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons, not permitting them to speak because they knew him. Rising very early before dawn, he left and went off to a deserted place, where he prayed. Simon and those who were with him pursued him and on finding him said, "Everyone is looking for you." He told them, "Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also. For this purpose have I come." So he went into their synagogues, preaching and driving out demons throughout the whole of Galilee.

#### **FAITH SHARING**

Today's readings challenge us to avoid Job's pessimistic and desperate view of life as a chain of pain and sufferings and to accept life with hope and optimism as a precious gift from God, using it to do good for others and spending our time, talents and lives for others.

The first reading details Job's frustrations in striking contrast: Job



complains of the tedium and futility of life and the miseries of human existence. But eventually, his eyes opened by God, Job surrenders himself, his su ffering, his work and everything he had had and lost to God's greater wisdom.

<u>The second reading</u> reveals Paul to us as a true, dynamic follower of Jesus, preaching the Gospel to the people, and serving them as their slave with love and fidelity.

Pointing out the spontaneous response of Peter's mother-in-law after she had been healed by Jesus, today's Gospel teaches us that true discipleship means giving selfless, loving service to others. Mark shows us a typical Sabbath day in Jesus' ministry: taking part in the synagogue worship, teaching with authority, exorcising a demon, healing Simon's mother-in-law and, after sundown, curing "many who were sick with various diseases, and [driving] out many demons" – a full day and evening of selfless ministry. Yet, Jesus rises early the next morning and goes off "to a deserted place" to pray, in order to assess his work before God his Father and to recharge his spiritual batteries.



#### LIFE MESSAGE

We all need healing for our minds, our memories, and our broken relationships, and now Jesus is also using counselors, doctors, friends, or even strangers in his healing ministry. Let us ask for the ordinary healing we need in our own lives. When we are healed, let us not

forget to thank Jesus for his goodness, mercy, and compassion by turning to serve others. Our own healing process is completed only when we are ready to help others in their needs and to focus on things outside ourselves. Let us also be instruments for Jesus' healing by visiting the sick and praying for their healing. But let us remember that we need the Lord's strength not only to make ourselves and others well, but to make us and others whole.

#### THE SEASON OF PRE-LENT

The celebration of this season is a **preparation** for Holy Lent. The three Sundays of Pre-Lent come seventy, sixty and fifty days before Easter. The **liturgical color** of this season which prepares us to anticipate the spiritual rigors of the Lenten Season is **rose**. Lent then takes on the somber hue of purple signifying the seven week period of penitence and introspection and our conversion of heart.

During Pre-Lent the **Alleluia** heard before the proclamation of the Gospel **is eliminated** from the Mass and will continue to be so through Lent until Easter morning. In place of the Alleluias, we will hear only a mournful chant called the Tract.

Also begun in Pre-Lent is the **elimination of the singing of the Gloria** which will remain silenced through the Lenten season until the Resurrection of Jesus is proclaimed on Easter.

Floral adornments of the high altar are still appropriate through Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday, though such adornment may be abandoned if so desired.

#### ST. BLAISE THROAT BLESSING

Yesterday, Saturday, Feb 3 was the Feast of St. Blaise, Bishop who was martyred in the year 316 AD. The oldest accounts tell us that Blaise was a physician at Sebesta before he was made bishop. In the 4<sup>th</sup> century persecution of Licinius, St. Blaise was taken prisoner. After suffering various forms of torture he was beheaded.

The most popular story attributed to St. Blaise occurred while he was in prison, when he cured a young boy who was in danger of choking to death because of a fishbone in his throat. That story, and the fact that St. Blaise was a doctor, made the saint very popular for intercessory prayer for throat ailments.

At an early date, the veneration of this Eastern saint was brought into Europe, and Blaise became one of the most popular saints of the Middle Ages. Numberless churches and altars were dedicated to him.

The blessing of St. Blaise will be given at Holy Family Church at the 10:00

## AM Mass on Sunday, February 4.


The blessing of the throat is carried out using two white taper candles that were blessed on Friday, February 2, the Presentation of the Lord (Candlemas Day).

The white color of the candles symbolizes

purity. A red ribbon draped over the base of the candles symbolizes the martyrdom of St. Blaise. The candles are grasped in an X-shape and held up to the throat of the person receiving the blessing: "Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

## **ASH WEDNESDAY - FEBRUARY 14, 2024**

With Ash Wednesday we begin the holy season of Lent, our time for penance, reflection, and reconciliation. This is the time when we mark our souls with the cross. As a visible sign we want to mark our foreheads with the sign of the cross made with Ashes. Please come for Holy Mass at 10:00 AM (Fr. Bruce – celebrant) or 7:00 PM (Fr. Mariusz – celebrant). Ashes to be distributed at both Masses.



Ash Wednesday is a holy day of obligation, and the distributing of the Ashes cannot be transferred to Sunday nor any other day.

#### INSTITUTION OF THE PNCC

The anniversary of the founding of the PNCC jest celebrated on the second Sunday in March (March 10<sup>th</sup> this year). Although this Sunday falls in Lent, we nonetheless commemorate our founding. The Solemnity of the Institution is celebrated in white with a hymn Gloria. ## LENTEN LAMENTATIONS – GORZKIE ŻALE

One of the signs of Lent in the Polish community are the Gorzkie Żale, called in English Lenten Lamentations or Bitter Lamentations, sung at church on Sundays during that somber season. They're a series of melancholic hymns about Jesus Christ's passion and death, meant to be a form of grieving for His suffering. The Lenten Lamentations are divided into three parts. Part one recalls Christ's agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, arrest and unjust trial. Part two recalls Christ's suffering from his unjust trial to His being crowned with thorns. Part three recalls Christ's crucifixion and death. Each part has its particular set of spoken intentions and hymns.

Bitter Lamentations are a particularly Polish Catholic tradition. Officially, the lamentations were first written down and sung on March 13, 1707 in Holy Cross Church in Warsaw.

Afterward, they spread to other churches around Poland and eventually wherever Poles emigrated. There are many different versions in English, however, none of them is good enough, because Lamentations were written in



old Polish language, even partially nonunderstandable to native Polish speakers today. Also, the melodies, music was composed to Polish phrases, not easy adjustable to English. Therefore, the best way is to use Polish or mix Polish-English.

We encourage all of you to attend at least once this devotion during Lent to hear these lamentations. Even if you cannot understand Polish, the haunting melodies will certainly move you. When done correctly, the Gorzkie Żale truly make it feel as if Christ is suffering right in front of you, and you with Him.

Lenten Lamentations will be held at Holy Family church in the first (Feb 18), second (Feb 25) and third (March 3) Sunday of Lent at 3:00 PM and on Good Friday at 7:00 PM.

The Polish and English subtitles will be displayed on the screen.

Our Special Lenten Penitential Service will be held on Friday, March 22<sup>nd</sup> after Stations at 7:00 PM. Plan on attending and make this year truly a Great Lent. Let us prepare for Easter. You can also schedule the individual confession or spiritual counseling at any time.
